### **Principal's Letter**

Tisbury School Community:

Undoubtedly, we look forward to being in the renovated school in September. That is something that has kept us going - the promise of a wonderful building to support teaching, learning, and growth. As we go about our business in the temporary school, I'm reminded daily of the creative, flexible approach we have adopted for the past 16 months. It's been impressive, taken a lot of work, and required much compromise.

For the past few years, we have endured relocation (2019), schooling during a pandemic (2020-2021), and moving into and occupying a temporary school (2022-2023). There have been times when I've felt discouraged and even embarrassed that we were not able to provide for students what we wanted to. But there have been many more occasions when I've felt proud and inspired, as I've witnessed our staff and students rise up, accept adversity, and work to overcome challenges. These challenges have included restructuring activities such as lunch, recess, sports, and extracurricular events. Without proper space in the temporary school, teachers and students have adapted, getting the most out of what we have. (Recently, when walking through the school construction site, some teachers remarked that they have nearly forgotten what it was like to have a gymnasium, cafeteria in the same building, stairwells, wide hallways, and enough classrooms to house all programs.) We have adjusted to the new conditions and routines required in the temporary school. Certainly, there are moments of frustration when the space limits our opportunities. However, I hear little negativity and complaining. That says something about our school culture.

As I noted at a recent faculty meeting, I never take this for granted, and acknowledge that it does not simply happen on its own. A healthy, positive school culture requires buy-in, professionalism, and a collective spirit focused on students' needs. The Tisbury School has enjoyed a positive culture for a long time. I felt this immediately when I joined the staff in 2004. Even with the significant challenges over the past few years, our school culture has remained strong. The support from families, taxpayers, the School Committee, and town departments provides important backing that allows staff to focus on children's learning and growth. I've believed for many years that there is no more important building in a town than its school, as the work that happens in schools cannot be overvalued. Kids benefit when their school experience takes place in a building with a strong, healthy culture. Staff benefit from it, too.

We are fortunate. I remind myself and others of this occasionally, but probably not often enough. Acknowledging our school's strength and healthy culture is important, even as we look to improve in certain areas. Public schools are seeing some real challenges as they work to address students' academic and social-emotional needs, following the pandemic. At times, it can feel daunting, as we consider the magnitude of our responsibility. I have great confidence in our school, because I observe regularly how much we care about this responsibility and about our students. As much as anything, that collective care defines us, and is a major reason why we - the Tisbury School community - are fortunate. Thank you for doing your part to contribute to our strength.

### **Tisbury Garden News**


The harvest of the month for March is eggs! Chickens begin to lay more eggs this time of year due to increasing daylight.




# DINKEYE (CONJUNCTIVITIS)

### PINK EYE IS OFTEN HIGHLY CONTAGIOUS.

### IT CAN BE CAUSED BY

- Viruses (very contagious)
- Bacteria (very contagious)
- Allergens, like pollen (not contagious)
- Irritants, like smoke or dust (not contagious)







### SYMPTOMS USUALLY

### **INCLUDE:**

- Redness or swelling
- Watery eyes
- A gritty feel
- Itchiness, irritation, or burning
- Discharge
- Crusting of the eyelids or eyelashes

### SEE A DOCTOR IF YOU

HAVE PINK EYE ALONG WITH ANY OF THE FOLLOWING: Eve pain

- Sensitivity to light or blurred vision
- Intense eye redness
- Symptoms that get worse or don't improve
- A weakened immune system, for example from HIV or cancer treatment
- Pre-existing eye conditions



Newborns with symptoms of pink eye should see a doctor right away. A doctor can usually diagnose the cause of pink eye based on symptoms and patient history.



### PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS FROM PINK EYE

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, and help young children do the same. Wash hands especially well after touching someone with pink eye or their personal items.
- Avoid touching or rubbing your eyes. This can worsen the condition or spread it to your other eye.
- Avoid sharing personal items, such as makeup, eye drops, towels, bedding, contact lenses and containers, and eyeglasses.
- Do not use the same eye products for your infected and non-infected eyes.
- Stop wearing contact lenses until your eye doctor says it's okay.
- Clean, store, and replace your contact lenses as instructed by your eye doctor.
