Our band will be playing and flags will be waving and we hope that you will come downtown to see the parade. Students in grade 8 will be helpers on the pier and with elementary classes.

As we prepare to graduate thirty-four 8th grade students in June, we are mindful of their positive impact on our school. The class endured much adversity in recent years, and we are therefore pleased that they had the opportunity to be in the renovated school during their final year before starting high school. Included in this 8th grade class are several students who joined us in September, or during this school year. They have come together and will graduate as one – the Tisbury School Class of 2025. Please join us if you are able, at the graduation ceremony on June 11 at 5:00 pm in the school gymnasium, as we celebrate them.

Our school is well-supported by so many in our community, and all support is appreciated. One group in particular that deserves special thanks is the Tisbury School Parent-Teacher Organization. This year, a handful of dedicated parents have stepped up and added new energy and life to the PTO efforts. Their thoughtful work demonstrates their care for our school, and we all benefit.

The shellfish surprise concluded with an exciting challenge of counting how many scallops Mr. Custer could open in one minute. (8!!) Tisbury Garden News

The sun is shining and Spring has sprung! We will be planting seeds and seedlings in our new garden beds all month. The 3rd grade's peas are taller by the minute, and are being lovingly tended and measured weekly.

4th grade Spanish classes are starting their bed of traditional foods from Mexico after spending much of the winter learning about them and starting all the seeds themselves...amaranth, Oaxacan tomatoes, tomatillos, cempasuchil (marigolds), tiger eye beans, and jalapeno peppers.

Kindergarten has started some pots of sunflowers on their new back patio. The 5th grade classes will be planting a traditional Indigenous bed of the Three Sisters--corn, beans and squash.

The 2nd grade will be having their seedling sale at the end of the month. Stay tuned for more info. The sale will take place during Wellness Week.

The Harvest of the Month is herbs.

Last month the 7th grade Social Studies students learned about the history and mythology connections of herbs from Ancient Greece and will be planting an herb

garden. Oregano, lemon balm, thyme, mint and rosemary, sage and more. They all were used as food and medicine in ancient Greece!

Students can visit the media center to do an activity of exploring and smelling herbs and trying to connect them to their correct names.

Congratulations to 5th grader Sajhaun Wilson, who won last month's trivia question :*How many bay scallops can Mr. Custer shuck in one minute?*

Sajhaun entered the correct answer, 10 (even though Mr. Custer only shucked 8 in one minute when he was under the watchful eyes of the 3rd grade).

Our 7th graders are in a unit titled "Weather and Water". They are studying the layers of the atmosphere, air pressure and what affects the weather patterns we see on Earth. We are looking forward to a trip to Felix Neck on May 21st and a trip to Penikese Island in early June.



8th Grade Science

The 8th graders have been working on Earth Science topics such as mapping earthquakes, tectonic plate movements, ocean floor mapping and a review of the rock cycle. They enjoyed making sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous rocks in a lab with Starbursts just before April vacation. We are also reviewing for the 8th grade science MCAS test which will be administered on May 19th.

Spanish News



During the last month **Kindergarten** learned about feelings and springtime. We read books about animals and they practiced by playing games.



First graders learned vocabulary of the weather in Spring. They listened to the stories and participated actively in our class.

Second graders learned about traditions in South America during Easter time. They listened to Spanish songs and stories. They loved freeze dance.

Third graders continue with our routine. We started at the library. We had been reading books about animals. The kids are very engaged. We practiced in our class with songs and interactive activities.

Fourth graders learned about clothes, food and seeds from South America. At the end of the month they were planting seeds in our "Salsa garden" with our amazing Sam Greene. We are excited to see them growing. We will get our own Tiger bean.

Fifth graders practice adjectives, compare and contrast. They learned about an easter tradition in Guatemala."Las alfombras" (carpets) They memorized the song "De colores". Practiced some Math skills in Spanish.

Sixth graders practiced more about verbs. They had conversations about likes and dislikes. They started the class with a dance activity.

Eighth graders were pretty busy this month. They finished a placement test in Spanish. Portuguese speakers finished the Portuguese test. Most of them are excited about the language program at the high school. I am proud of our students. Gracias!

Health Education

Most grades are into their final units of the school year! **Kindergarten** is working through their safety unit by identifying safety signs in our school, community and the greater world. They are also learning hand signals to be better prepared to ride their bikes and scooters in the coming months.

1st grade finished their unit on fire safety and put their classroom lessons into practice: they identified tools on a fire truck, which tools are safe for them to use vs. the fire department, got to see the firefighter gear in-person and sprayed the fire hose. We are thankful to Tisbury Fire Chief



Patrick Roston, Lieutenant James Cleary and Paramedic/Firefighter Jason Davey for making this unit not only possible but an anchor experience for 1st graders.



2nd graders completed part of their safety unit with a visit from the folks at the Tisbury Ambulance. Students explored tools on the ambulance: a stretcher, an AED, ice packs, gauze, a triangle bandage and the "first-in" bag. We are thankful to Paramedic

Supervisor Jason Davey, EMT Ashley Wood and EMT Tad Medeiros for joining us. All of these folks attended Tisbury School at one point during their elementary years - we were excited to welcome them to our finished building project.

6th graders continue to learn about body systems in health class. This year's group got to use a polybones skeleton kit to complete a skeletal system relay. Students had to identify 12 different bones and correctly build a skeleton. We also identified different types of fractures. We are moving into the muscular system and students are curious about how muscles connect to bones and support our bodies throughout our daily lives





Kindergarten molded pinch pots, imprinted flowers and glazed pots with analogous colors (colors near each other on the color wheel).

First Grade crafted 3D tissue paper flowers for Mother's Day, by layering colors and scrunching each layer.

Second and Third grade rendered and painted watercolor flowers, using wet on wet and dry techniques.

Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Grade has been practicing making 3D block letters, and investigating one point perspective in a landscape. It's quite impressive the fourth grade could understand this advanced skill of making things look farther away in the distance!

Seventh Grade has made mugs with slab construction and imprinted textures, letters, or an outline of the island. All mugs use lead free and dinnerware safe glaze.

Eighth Grade has been constructing bridges for an engineering/ weight bearing challenge! Whose design will hold the most weight? Tension, compression, force and load were investigated before the design process in conjunction with Science class.
